Update on PAL/RPAL/CORE courses:

After careful review and consultations with Service BC and IHA we are going ahead with the rescheduled PAL/RPAL/CORE courses (see February Newsletter) in accordance with the latest Provincial Health Officer, Gathering and Events Order, dated February 10, 2021.

A COVID-19 Pandemic Safety Plan for PAL/RPAL/CORE courses, dated February 20, 2021, has been forwarded to all registered students and is posted on our website:

Following is the status of the courses as of February 20:

March 6 PAL - full (12 seats)

March 7 PAL- full (12 seats)

March 27 PAL – a few vacancies, some reserved for RPAL (24 seats)

May 8 PAL - 8 vacancies (12 seats) June 6 PAL - 11 vacancies (12 seats)

March 28 RPAL - 8 vacancies (24 seats)

April 17/18 CORE – full (24 seats

June 12/13 CORE - 16 vacancies (24 seats)

PAL is a prerequisite for RPAL. If you want both PAL and CORE courses, it is recommended that PAL be taken first. The first CORE course should allow students to get their hunter numbers in time for Limited Entry Hunting (LEH) draws for this fall. The June CORE will be in time for students to get a hunting licence and tags for the fall General Open Season but will miss the LEH draw deadline for fall 2021.


Letter to the Editor:


The Nelson District Rod and Gun Club has been involved with the sheep feeding program since 1984. There is a growing concern amongst club members about the declining numbers of sheep at the feeding site.

The last few years have painted a troubling picture, as depicted in the following charts, of the significant decline in herd population. The highest recorded number of sheep that I could find was 43 in 2006. The highest number of rams was 6 photographed in October 2019, but there were only 4 recorded during that feeding season (one collared ram was a known non traffic fatality). Highway fatalities have been a concern since construction of the highway which prompted the start of the sheep feeding program. In would appear there are at least two highway fatalities per year... if this trend continues, the herd will be eradicated











The current signs are 2 km on either side of the feeding site. Considering the recent highway fatalities, they appear to not be adequate. At a minimum there should be flashing signage when wildlife are near the highway.

In the East Kootenays there is an effort in the Township of Radium to create a wildlife overpass to secure safe passage for the bighorn sheep herd that lives there. I would love to see an overpass constructed for our herd.

I will be bringing this up with Brittny Anderson, MLA, for Nelson-Creston and (hopefully) Katrine Conroy, MLA for Kootenay West and Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations, and Rural Development.

History:



Local Rod and Gun Club Leases the Old Hatchery.

That was the headline from the Nelson Daily News March 19, 1970.

City Council granted the club a five-year lease. In a letter to city council, the club planned on spending \$4500 to fix the old building.

City Council noted that the building may have to be moved because of the new highway link which passed near the building. Our club agreed to move the building to another site, but hoped "the building could be left in its present picturesque location".

Below is the newspaper clipping. I have summarized it above as it may be difficult to read. Thank you, Marvin **Paisner**, for this very interesting look at our club's history.

Local Rod and Gun Leases the Old Hate

The Nelson Rod and Gun club! Monday night was given a five year lease to the old Fish Hatchery building for use as a club meeting centre.

City council granted the club a five-year lease at a nominal charge of \$1 a year, providing the building was also available for other clubs to use.

The Rod and Gun club, in a letter to city council, said it planned to spend about \$4,500 on fixing the old building.

No timetable was set for the meetings.

A possible crackdown on noisy brakes on large trucks may arise from city council's Monday night meeting.

Council received a letter from the Union of British Columbia Municipalities advising that noise from exhause retarder brakes was a problem in many communities,

Theexecutive of the UBCM advised councils to instruct their City council noted that the building may have to be moved

be waived in order to let the guides carry out the project.

"Maybe they'll teach some of our citizens a thing or two," Mayor Louis Maglio said.

City council granted \$50 to L. V. Rogers Bomberettes girls' basketball team to defray the cost of a trip to New Westminster to compete in the provincial championships.

Howje Ridge, the coach of the team, said in a letter to council that the team had raised most of the expense money, but a con-

building may have to be moved because of the new highway link which passes near the building in Cootenwood Park.

However, the club said it was willing to have the building moved to another site and would make no objection.

The club said it would use the building as an indoor shooting range, which would be open to other organizations, as a club for meetings, and as a hall for dances and other events,

The building would be completely rewired and remodelled on the outside and the grounds would be cleared and cleaned.

"We hope that it (the building) could be left in its present picturesque location." the club said.

The lease is being drawn up by the city's legal advisor.

Feb. 1st marked the 125th anniversary of Nelson's hydroelectric power plant on Cottownwood Creek. It was the first hydro-electric generating facility in BC. Below is a picture of two artifacts from the 1896 plant, a pulley wheel and a generator. Touchstones Museum, Nelson Public Works Dept. and the **Nelson Izushi Friendship Society** worked together to move the artifacts back to their original location. They can be viewed on the west side of the creek near the falls and close to the Club's entrance to the indoor ranges. The Izu-shi Friendship Society is seeking photos of the 1896 Cottonwood Creek light plant station.

Dear Conservation Leader,

Dear Honorable Premier,

If we told you that you could make a difference to ensure sound wildlife populations, and not only stabilize, but increase them, would you do it? Now more than ever, our fish, wildlife and habitat need action and to be managed by the best available science available to our biologists.

The Wild Sheep Society of British Columbia is a one-thousand-member organization, who are vitally concerned that once again our wildlife has become a pawn in the electoral cycle. We continue to watch the constant barrage of hate towards us and continue to lose social license at an alarming rate due to misinformation and spin-doctoring by organizations whose only goal is to end hunting.

Government and non-government wildlife experts continually tell us that changes to hunting regulations alone, do not significantly impact trends in wildlife populations. Scientific and cultural knowledge are the most effective management tools.

We are speaking loudly against the untruths we face as hunters, conservationists, and consumptive users of our backcountry in British Columbia. No hunter wants to see the extinction of a species, which is most often the point these campaign attacks continually push. We are the first to sound an alarm if there are issues. Volunteer ran and funded organizations like ours donate and contribute tens of thousands of hours, and hundreds of thousands of dollars a year towards wildlife and habitat.

Your government has continued to back science-based wolf management regarding mountain caribou, and it has shown incredible strides in their recovery. We urge you to take the same approach to all wildlife in British Columbia, and to leave these decisions to the biologists and wildlife managers.

We know this latest attack is the tip of the iceberg with the end goal being the complete elimination of hunting. This is not about some wildlife- it is about all wildlife and the wild spaces we share.

Honorable Premier, the mantra of a hunter is to 'leave the backcountry a little better than you found it'. By managing wildlife by science, you can stand side by side and begin to put the Beautiful back in Beautiful British Columbia. Stand with us as we do this, together.

This is a legacy we can all be proud of.
