
We are off to a running start with our Annual General Meeting & Elections:

Legacy Project Bow Donation

NDRGC member Uli Lenhert of Heron Mark is once again donating a bow for the Club to sell. This time, the proceeds will go towards the Legacy Project at the rifle range. Purchasing this bow is a great way to donate towards the legacy project while adding a functioning piece of art to your quiver! This bow

The bow is inspired by the famous Bear Super Kodiak, an all-time favourite of hunters as it is a shorter recurve (63") with an unusually long riser (27") and short snappy limbs. The bow is dead in the hand, quiet, and fast. This bow is not only a great shooter, but also a display of woodworking mastery.

At first glance, you can appreciate the 200 hours of meticulous craft that Uli put into this recurve. Uli built two strings for this Super Kodiac, a classic 14-strand Astro flight with Cat Whiskers silencers and brush buttons, perfect for hunting; and a 10-strand fast flight for 3D and target archery. This replica shoots exactly as I would expect from the Original Bear, even better, as this one has an insert suitable for weights and wrist sling. Pacific Partners Boating Bulletin January 2024 Anchoring Safely

Knowing how to anchor is an important aspect of safe boating and a skill that all operators should master. Anchoring safely and correctly will keep you from drifting out to sea or washing ashore.

Choose an area to anchor with plenty of open space that is clear of other boats and hazards. When anchoring your vessel make sure there is adequate water depth and preferably sand or mud on the bottom of the waterway. Make sure that when the boat swings around due to wind or current, the boat will not hit another boat, go aground, or hit underwater obstructions. The ideal location for anchor would be sheltered from wind, waves, and currents.

Lower the anchor slowly.

Have your boat come to a complete stop and slowly lower the anchor and line, hand over hand, over the bow to the bottom. Do not throw the anchor. Never anchor from the stern as this can cause the boat to become submerged.

Secure the anchor firmly and check for dragging.

Once the anchor is on the bottom you may be able to feel it drag. When the anchor "sets" firmly, the boat will stop. You can pull on the anchor line to check that the anchor is set. Tie the anchor line securely to the bow of your boat. To confirm that your boat is not dragging pick a landmark on shore and see if it stays in its relative position to your boat. If the position of the landmark changes significantly you may need to reset the anchor. Monitor your surroundings frequently.

Use Anchor lights.

From sunset to sunrise boaters must display an all-around white light on the vessel to indicate to others that their boat is at anchor. This keeps you and others safe when they are boating at night.

Club Policy 2022.04.09 Orientation for Outdoor Range

Preamble

The Nelson District Rod & Gun Club is a volunteer organization.

We all have a rolel to play in the safety of our members and the public, and the maintenance of our facilities.

The following rules must be read and acknowledged before use of the Outdoor Range is permitted.

Section 1 – General Rules

- 1. Disrespectful or abusive behaviour is not tolerated within the Nelson District Rod & Gun Club and its facilities.
- 2. Shooting times are from 7:30 a.m. to Dusk. No shooting after dark.
- 3. Remember to have the gate locked while using the range and when you leave.
- 4. Sign in before you shoot. This is required for insurance purposes. Must record name and membership number in the sign-in log.
- 5. Members must carry their membership card while at a Club facility or a Club sponsored function and produce same when asked to do so. Anyone on using the property without a membership or not accompanied by a member, will be required to leave the property immediately.
- 6. All guests must be signed in, and will be under the supervision of the Member whose guest they are.
- 7. Members and guests re required to follow the direction of the Club Executive, the Director in charge of the Outdoor Range, Safety Officers and/or their designates at all times.
- 8. All junior members (less than 18 years old) must be supervised be an adult.
- 9. Club range procedures and rules can be found on the website.
- 10. The Club Executive, the Director in charge of the Range, Safety Officers and/or their designate can direct an individual or group to leave the premises if an individual or member of a group is
 - a. engaging in unsafe practices;
 - b. violating range rules; or
 - c. engaging in unacceptable behaviour.


This will now be dealt with by Club policy so that, in the event of a necessary change. The by-laws need not be impacted.

Ship has taken on water and in danger of capsizing, I require immediate assistance, 4 persons on board, are taking to liferaft, Over."
