

GRIZZLY BEAR ALERT



Please be aware there is a grizzly sow with a cub and a male grizzly in the area of the Porto Rico Road Outdoor Range. The attached photo depicts the male that made his appearance on May 3 shortly after everyone had left the Outdoor Range clean up. It appears the bears are focused on feeding on what appears to be sawdust, although the contents haven't been determined yet. The Conservation Office is investigating the incident and looking for information on person or persons responsible for leaving this attractant in the bush. Area residents are concerned because that portion of Porto Rico Road is a drop off and pick up point for the school bus. If you have information regarding this incident, please contact the Conservation Office.

BCWF welcomes former COS chief Doug Forsdick

The B.C. Wildlife Federation is delighted to announce that Doug Forsdick, the former chief of the Conservation Officer Service, will chair the Federation's Enforcement Committee.

The Committee is dedicated to building a strong relationship between the BCWF and B.C.'s conservation enforcement community, including Natural Resource Officers, Conservation and Protection Officers, and the Conservation Officer Service. Through the Enforcement Committee, the BCWF supports investigations and compliance actions.

As chief of the COS Doug supported consistent outreach and collaboration between the Service and the BCWF, building lasting, productive relationships with a goal of protecting fish, wildlife and habitat.

Doug has long been a staple at BCWF conventions, where he and his team engaged our members, sought feedback, discussed big picture issues, and designed collaborative solutions. His officers also regularly attended B.C. Wildlife Federation club and regional meetings across the province to build local relationships. Under his leadership, Conservation Officers regularly attended trade shows and community events to educate and earn the trust of anglers, hunters and the public.

Doug was instrumental in supporting the B.C. Invasive Mussel Program, advocating for funding and capacity to attempt to keep B.C.'s waters free of these invasive species. Those efforts were recently rewarded with changes to the Wildlife Act that give new protections the force of law.

Doug recently retired from conservation service after 35 years, most recently serving as the Executive Lead at the Compliance and Enforcement Division of the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy. Doug began his career as a Conservation Officer in 1990 and served in nearly every capacity the CO Service has to offer. A graduate of Royal Roads University and the Justice Institute of British Columbia, Doug is also the author of Mind the Gap: Navigating Your Leadership Journey. Doug is a recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal and is a Certified Executive Coach with the International Coaching Federation and operates Doug Forsdick Coaching and Consulting Services in Victoria. B.C.

Doug has served as president of the Canadian Natural Resource Law Enforcement Chiefs Association, Biathlon BC, and the North American Wildlife Enforcement Officers Association.

"We look forward to continuing our work with Doug Forsdick," said BCWF Executive Director Jesse Zeman. "He already has several lifetimes worth of accomplishments to his credit, and we are excited to see what we can accomplish together as he begins his next chapter."



Bear Smart Community Program

Every year, hundreds and sometimes thousands of bears are destroyed as a result of conflicts between people and bears.

In rare instances, people are injured or killed as a result of these conflicts.

Most of these problems begin when people give bears access to non-natural food, such as garbage.

The program

The Bear Smart Community Program has been designed by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy in partnership with the British Columbia Conservation Foundation and the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

It's a voluntary, preventative conservation measure that encourages communities, businesses and individuals to work together.

The goal is to address the root causes of human-bear conflicts, thereby reducing the risks to human safety and private property, as well as the number of bears that have to be destroyed each year.

This program is based on a series of criteria that communities must achieve in order to be recognized as 'bear smart.'

The responsibility to manage human-bear conflicts rests with everyone.

The Bear Smart Community Program requires participation from the B.C. government, municipal governments and local citizens to be successful.

Check your bear spray expiration date!

Bear spray typically has a shelf life of 3 to 5 years. After this period, the propellant pressure may decrease, making it unreliable. It's recommended to replace bear spray after the expiration date to ensure it's effective.

Orphaned black bear cubs

In BC, our approach to orphaned black bear cubs is based on the latest wildlife management science, suitability criteria for rehabilitation and rearing best practices, and prioritizes public safety.

Provincial response guidelines for incidents involving orphaned black bear cubs give authorities several options when determining the appropriate course of action, including rehabilitation at a permitted rearing facility. Human help may be appropriate in some cases but not every cub requires intervention. Some animals have better chances of recovery when left in the wild. Sometimes, the best course of action is to let wild animals remain wild. Cubs suspected of being orphaned will be monitored for 48 hours before a decision on capturing is made.

The Province - which includes the Conservation Officer Service (COS) with the Ministry of Environment and Parks, wildlife biologists and the provincial wildlife veterinarian with the Ministry of Water, Lands, and Resource Stewardship (WLRS) - and authorized rearing facilities, each have a role in response to orphaned black bear cubs, and work together to determine how and where to respond.

The public also has a key role to play to help keep wildlife wild. People are encouraged to ensure attractants on their properties are securely stored to prevent bears and other wildlife from accessing them. 

Trap Range

The outdoor range at Porto Rico Road is maintained by volunteers who spend a great deal of time, effort and money to enhance your shooting experience. Our club puts very few limitations on our members to use this range. There are obviously safety rules in place to ensure that everyone goes home without any issues and of course you are asked to pick up spent hulls and keep the range clean. It's really not that difficult folks especially if we all did our part! Over and above the club rules there are rules issued to each of the three venues by the Chief Firearms Officer (CFO). Disobeying any of these rules can result in serious consequences for the outdoor range and the club. With this in mind, I will address the rules issued by the CFO in our Shooting Range Approval for the Trap Range; NO Handguns and NO Rifles. The Trap Range is approved for trap shooting only with lead shot sizes #9, #8 and #7.5, NO slugs, NO Steel shot, NO skeet shooting and NO sporting clays shooting. The range will be inspected at the discretion of the Chief Firearms Officer to ensure the range continues to meet public safety requirements and continued compliance. Any member using any one of the venues at the outdoor range should make themselves aware of the Shooting Range Approval for each venue. We don't want to be shut down!

Finally, and on a more positive note, trap shooting has started on Sundays 10:00 am until 12:00 pm weather and participation dependant. As before I will send out an email on or around Wednesday to determine if there is any interest for the upcoming Sunday and then I will send out another email on Friday advising whether or not there will be trap shooting. Trap fees will remain the same as last year; \$7.00 for clays and \$15.00 for a box of shells. We are able to maintain prices thanks to Jordan Braun for not only picking up the shells that I ordered last year but purchasing more because of an even better sale price! (He even managed to get my shells for the lower price!). While I am at it, I would like to thank the folks that came out on Saturday May 3rd for range clean-up day a lot of good work was accomplished, and last but not least thanks also to Sandy Russell for erecting our canopy very handily.




